Dear Chairwoman Granger, Chairwoman Murray, Ranking Member DeLauro, and Vice Chair Collins,

On October 25, 2023, President Biden submitted a request to Congress for emergency supplemental funding for key domestic priorities, including \$6 billion to extend the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). As advocates of affordable internet, we strongly urge you, at a minimum, to support this request for short term funding to ensure that the ACP is able to continue through the end of 2024.

Over 21 million households have enrolled in the ACP, and, without additional funding, families across the country are at risk of being disconnected. Internet access is <u>essential</u> to <u>ensuring that every American can benefit</u> fully from educational resources, healthcare services, and job opportunities. Our <u>research</u> also found that ACP helps extend BEAD dollars to ensure that these resources are maximized to reach as many households as possible. States are relying on the ACP to meet BEAD's affordability requirements; in fact, <u>Lousiana and Virgina's plans</u>, which require participation in the ACP, have already been approved by NTIA. As states complete their plans for BEAD, the ACP will be critical to ensuring every home and business in America has affordable high-speed internet. Congress has an opportunity to ensure funding so that the ACP doesn't lapse, imperiling these important investments in broadband infrastructure.

According to our <u>analysis</u>, the ACP is on track to run out of funding in Q2 of 2024. President Biden's request will ensure that the program continues to meet its obligations through the end of 2024. Moreover, this funding gives Congress, the FCC, and advocates additional time to develop and implement a long-term funding mechanism.

We know you have many competing funding priorities before the end of the year, but the ACP is an essential component of America's economic growth, workforce development, and innovation. Allowing funding to lapse would be a great disservice to families who rely on the funding to access vital services and resources.

We strongly urge you to support additional funding for the ACP. The President's request to Congress is a critical step in the right direction, but we must continue our efforts to make the ACP and internet affordability permanent.
